# Florida Bobcats: Elusive Predators of the Sunshine State

Florida, known for its alligators and panthers, is also home to a lesser-known but equally fascinating predator — the bobcat (Lynx rufus floridanus). As one of the most adaptable and widespread wildcats in North America, the Florida bobcat plays an essential role in maintaining ecological balance. While sightings are rare due to their stealthy nature, these elusive creatures are an integral part of Florida's diverse wildlife.

### **Physical Characteristics**

Florida bobcats are medium-sized wildcats, larger than domestic cats but smaller than their cousin, the Florida panther. Adults typically weigh between 15 to 35 pounds and measure around 2 to 4 feet in length. Their fur is usually reddish-brown or grayish with black spots and a white underbelly. One of their most distinguishing features is their short, "bobbed" tail, which gives the species its name.

They also have tufted ears, facial ruffs, and sharp eyesight and hearing, which help them remain effective hunters and avoid larger predators, including humans.

### **Habitat and Range**

Bobcats are found throughout Florida, from the swamps of the Everglades to suburban areas near Tampa and Orlando. Their habitats include forests, hammocks, swamps, and scrubland. Thanks to their adaptability, bobcats have even been spotted near agricultural lands and residential neighborhoods though they typically avoid direct human interaction.

They are solitary and territorial animals, with males occupying larger ranges than females. Their territory is marked using scent, and they avoid overlapping with other bobcats unless it's mating season.

# **Diet and Hunting Behavior**

Florida bobcats are carnivorous and primarily nocturnal hunters. Their diet consists of rabbits, rodents, birds, reptiles, and even small deer in some cases. They are ambush predators, using stealth and patience to get close to prey before launching a quick, powerful attack.

Interestingly, bobcats also help control populations of invasive species, such as nutria and non-native rodents, making them important players in maintaining Florida's ecological health.



### **Breeding and Life Cycle**

Bobcats typically breed in the late winter and early spring. After a gestation period of about 60 days, a female will give birth to a litter of 1 to 4 kittens, usually in a secluded den such as a hollow log, thicket, or rock crevice.

The kittens remain with their mother for several months, learning crucial survival skills before becoming independent. In the wild, bobcats can live up to 12 years, though many succumb to disease, predation, or accidents before reaching old age.

### **Conservation Status**

While the Florida bobcat is not considered endangered, it faces several threats, including habitat loss due to development, vehicle collisions, and poisoning from rodenticides. Despite these challenges, the species remains relatively stable, thanks to its adaptability and protected status under Florida law.

Conservation efforts, such as preserving natural habitats and raising awareness about native predators, help ensure that bobcats continue to thrive in the wild.

# **Human Interactions**

Though generally elusive, bobcats occasionally venture into suburban or rural areas. They are not typically aggressive toward humans but may prey on small livestock or pets if given the opportunity. It's essential for residents in bobcat territory to secure trash, avoid feeding wildlife, and keep pets indoors or supervised.

Wildlife agencies urge people to appreciate bobcats from a distance and to report any unusual behavior or frequent sightings to local officials.

# **Final Thoughts**

The Florida bobcat is a symbol of the wild spirit that still thrives across the Sunshine State. Mysterious, resilient, and deeply connected to the ecosystems they inhabit, these felines are an important reminder of the untamed natural world that exists just beyond Florida's bustling cities and tourist hotspots.

By understanding and respecting the Florida bobcat, we take a step toward preserving the wild heart of the state for generations to come.

# **Derelict Boats Removed from Local Waters**

Good news for our community and the health of our waterways: several derelict and abandoned boats have recently been removed from the Indian River Lagoon and nearby waterways.

St. Lucie County, working in partnership with the Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), has stepped up efforts to identify and eliminate derelict vessels. These boats — often damaged, abandoned, or no longer seaworthy — pose safety risks, block navigation, damage sensitive habitats, and leak hazardous materials into the water.

### **Recent Successes**

A number of vessels have already been cleared. For example, the vessel "8 Knots" was recently removed from private property along the lagoon, and dozens of others have been hauled out between Fort Pierce and Boca Raton over the past several months.

### **Why It Matters**

Removing these vessels not only improves the beauty of our waterways but also protects water quality, wildlife, and property values.

### **Looking Ahead**

More removals are planned as the County and FWC continue their work. Boat owners are also encouraged to use Florida's Vessel Turn-In Program (VTIP), which allows owners to voluntarily surrender boats at no cost, preventing them from becoming hazards.


Our community benefits directly from these efforts. A cleaner, safer waterway enhances the quality of life here in Ocean Village and throughout Hutchinson Island.

Summer is never a good time for the Remembrance Garden to flourish, and this summer was particularly tough. The first half saw temperatures soaring, leaving the garden parched and withering from weeks and weeks of drought, even through August, usually thought of as the rainy month. September brought rain every day for over a week. Consequently, nothing new has been planted; therefore, this Garden Spot is about a tree unique to the Southwest.

Gene, my spouse, and I spent the month of May in Anthem, a suburb of Phoenix, where our daughter and grandson live. As we had a roomy Airbnb, we invited friends and relatives to visit. Ocean Village residents Carla Perrot and Charlie Daciek were our first guests. Among other activities, we took a walking food tour in the Old Town area of Scottsdale. As we stood in a small park, listening

to our guide's orientation to the area and its history, I noticed a tree behind her that had startling green trunk and limbs. I was mystified by the black concentric circles around the limbs. Naturally, I asked about it.

The Blue Palo Verde is a native of the Sonoran Desert, which occupies a large part of Arizona, California, and Mexico. Interestingly, the scientific name is Parkinsonia florida. Palo Verde means green trunk. Its bark is referred to as bluegreen; it looked quite bright green to me, and it is quite thin. The color allows it to photosynthesize during very dry periods. This is necessary because the Palo Verde has the smallest leaf size of any tree. In the spring it produces vibrant yellow flowers. We have seen carpets of gold along the streets when the leaves begin to fall.

As for the black rings: When the Scottsdale tree was younger, the city wrapped the limbs with Christmas lights and did not remove them quickly. Meanwhile, the tree continued to grow around the cords, leaving the scars where the cords had been. Mystery solved.

I have announced my retirement from the Garden and sincerely hope that others will step up to help keep it a beautiful place. Volunteers may contact me initially. For a brief time, I will still receive donations and provide forms for memorial bricks. # A Saturday Morning Walk on the Ocean Village Beach

As I head to the beach, I stop to visit with Kenny from CW Willis. He's already out in the dune this Saturday morning; he tells me he cannot relax until his dune responsibilities are completed. He holds a long-handled saw and is cutting back the sea grapes. The work, even at this early hour, is difficult, as he must bear up under the hot sun and humidity. His quarterly assignment here at Ocean Village will continue on indefinitely. He's helping us to keep the sea grapes, formally prized by Florida developers due to its fast growing nature, in check. He also treats invasive wedelia and sedge with herbicide to keep them from suffocating our native and rare dune plants.

I climb the stairs at the crossover, grab a bag at the Blue Tube dispenser, and see many railroad vines in bloom on both sides of the walkover. Their dainty purple flowers poke up among the seagrass and saw palmettos, capturing glints of morning light. I remember my sightings of three ospreys yesterday, one with a fish in its talons. There seem to be lots more ospreys this season than ever before -- at the ponds and shoreline.

Earlier today I saw one of the sea turtle monitors from Ecological Associates stop their 4-wheeler on the beach in front of Seascape I. Now there is a new turtle nest marked off on the beach (photo below). There are fewer turtle nests markings in September than when I was last at Ocean Village in late July. I suspect it's because, after 30 days, the observers remove their orange warning tape and rely on dropped GPS pins to compile and analyze turtle nesting data.

I make my way to the ocean's edge. The low tide seems so lazy, barely able to draw together enough energy to flip over at the frothy shoreline. Out to sea there are big balloons of clouds, hovering and seeding storms that roil the deep ocean waters. It's the time of year in which rain seems to threaten every afternoon and produces a few brief bursts of moisture on the island. When we do get those afternoon rain showers, the dune plants perk right up, getting more and more vibrant in deep green color and health.

A few other people have been picking up beach litter, yet there really isn't much washed up on our beach this month. That seems to be because we've had no significant storms of late, which would push litter from far shores up onto our beach. Fingers

crossed that we escape the hurricane season unscathed...

September mid-afternoons here at Ocean Village are -- honestly -- hot, but the worst part early in the month when I returned to Florida was the humidity. Late summer mornings and evenings are the times to go outside, enjoy a beach walk, pick up litter, and splash toes in the surf. As the month winds down, the humidity seems less pressing, and more beach umbrellas dot the Ocean Village beachfront.

I think ahead to the other Ocean Village owners who will return to their southern homes in the next month or two. Like me, they'll head out to the beach and use their walking time to pick up litter. As we do so, we are not only keeping the aesthetic appeal of our beach strong, but we will also help the vulnerable marine critters, who depend on the gifts of the ocean, to survive

The walk is good for the soul, as being close to nature is reinvigorating for the spirit.
